

# **Executive Summary**

The College was established in 1964, with the vision of enlightening the under-privileged students of this predominant refugee inhabited hinterland despite several odds and constraints.

The college had a modest beginning, a difficult adolescence and youth, but has a promising future, as stakeholders in this institution possess the desire to change and the capacity to actualize the desire. Along the last decade or so, the college has been showing vitality and planned consolidation on the basis of the strengths acquired in the past. We hope to gradually move towards growth and maturity.

### **Criteria-wise Summary**

#### 1.1 **Curriculum Planning and Implementation**

- 1. Well defined goals and objectives are in place
- 2. The college curriculum has undergone revisioning from time to time in conformity with temporal and spatial needs
- 3. Well defined Academic Calendar and Academic Plans are in place for effective delivery of the curriculum
- 4. Being an affiliated college the scope for designing and developing the curriculum is very limited
- 5. The college however appreciates the necessity of re[de]fining its vision to meet the temporal and spatial needs and has adopted a vision of Empowering the Community and with a goal to reach the outreach

#### 1.2 **Academic Flexibility**

1. Presently the college offers six Honours courses and ten general courses in B.A. B.Sc. and B.Com.

- 2. The college being affiliate by the university has very limited scope to provide flexibility to learners
- 3. The college does not have any proper self-financing academic programme or any add-on programme in that way but presently in collaboration with an external service provider four certificate courses are provided to the students against a very nominal fee.

#### 1.3 **Enrichment Curriculum**

- 1. Teachers upload enriching study materials in their Google drop box for the students to share.
- 2. The setting up of a computer training centre/laboratory not only for the students who have the necessity for computer literacy in their curriculum but also with the objective of providing basic computer literacy and internet facility to all students.
- 3. Providing reference materials and exam oriented notes, synopsis and write-ups.

#### 1.4 Feedback on Curriculum

- 1. The college makes use of ICT to obtain feedback on curriculum from various stakeholders.
- 2. Students' feedback on the teachers.
- 3. Students' feedback on the institution.

#### 2.1 **Students Enrolment and Profile**

1. The process of admission is guided by university rules and admission takes place strictly on the basis of merit.

- 2. The college follows online admission to ensure transparency.
- 3. Students belonging to reserved category, and physically challenged students comprise roughly one fourth of the total student strength, 13% are enrolled from minority communities and overall 39% are girl students.
- 4. In the current academic session 10 students have been enrolled from other states.

#### 2.2 **Catering to Diverse Needs**

- 1. The college makes use of ICT for conducting profile mapping of students to identify their relative strengths and weaknesses
- 2. Teachers remain involved in the mentoring and counseling of poor learners.
- 3. Students at risk of being drop outs are provided with financial and other possible support

#### 2.3 **Teaching-learning Process**

- 1. Classes are regularly held, as scheduled in the class routine.
- 2. The teaching-learning process is predominantly lecture based [making use of the conventional chalk and talk method] although some teachers make use of PPTs and other technologically empowered teaching practices to provide effective learning experience to the students
- 3. Some teachers are infusing innovative student centric learning processes like quiz and debate, workshop, survey.
- 4. The Principal takes keen interest in providing academic leadership to improve the teaching-learning process by constantly encouraging the teachers to take the

classes regularly, to counsel the students in their personal and academic issues or problems, to complete the syllabus well before the examination, to provide additional guidance to the poor learners etc.

#### 2.4 **Teacher Quality**

- 1. The teachers serving in full time substantive posts whose appointment in the college are subject to the fulfillment of UGC qualification, and successful performance during the rigorous interview convened by the West Bengal College Service Commission. The entire process is geared towards ensuring that the Full Time teachers are qualified and competent
- 2. Adequate measures are adopted to ensure that the teachers appointed as contractual whole timer and part time teachers are also qualified.
- 3. The teachers, however, accept the limitation that they have in the context of making use of ICT in teaching-learning and evaluation processes but have shown openness and determination in retraining them to acquire these competencies.

#### 2.5 **Evaluation Process and Reforms**

- 1. The students are generally assessed as per the schedule of the university and the progress of the students are monitored accordingly
- 2. The normal practices are term-end examinations [as scheduled by the university] where summative assessments are made as per the format of the university examinations
- 3. The college, however, believes that innovations in evaluation beyond the normal practice are necessary

- 4. The college aims at making assessment with tests that consists of short answertype and objective type questions avoiding questions that require long essay type answers as far as practicable. The principal objective being to encourage the students to move away from stereotypical note based learning / memorizing
- 5. Some departments have introduced the practice of home assignments, group quiz, multiple choice questions
- 6. The college has also introduced the practice of online assessment of the students with teachers preparing MCQ in their respective subjects

#### 2.5 **Learning outcome**

- 1. Percentage of successful students passing their examinations is quite high.
- 2. Efforts are being taken to enhance their employability.
- 3. Continuous efforts are being taken to reduce drop out.

#### 3.1 **Promotion of Research**

- 1. The research work of teachers at their personal level is encouraged by the Principal along with the IQAC and self-monitored by the concerned teachers.
- 2. There are many teachers engaged in research work and pursuing their M.Phil. and Ph.D. degrees.
- 3. There is a research committee comprising of Principal and faculty members of the college.

4. The college has organized four UGC sponsored seminar in the last academic session and five faculties out of eleven full time faculties applied for research grant to UGC under the minor research project scheme

#### 3.2 **Resource Mobilization for Research**

1. The Principal encourages teachers to mobilize research grant from the UGC

#### 3.3 **Research Facilities and Publication Output**

- 1. The college provides a Wi-Fi campus and facilities of N-List to the Teachers and students for online access to journals.
- 2. The college provides necessary support to its faculty to take active research initiatives.
- 3. Five books edited by faculty members of the college are published by the college.

#### 3.4 **Research Publication and Awards**

The research outputs of the teachers are as follows:

- 33% of full time full time substantive faculties are Ph.D. awarded.
- 58% of full time substantive faculties are awarded with M.Phil.
- Teachers have published their research papers in journal, edited books, seminar proceedings etc.

#### Consultancy 3.5

1. The college is yet to introduce consultancy activities.

#### 3.6 **Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibilities**

- 1. The college is organizing many extension activities by its NSS unit and the Students union such as blood donation campaign, blood donation camp, environmental awareness programme, health awareness programme etc.
- 2. By organizing NSS special camps preferably in backward villages and slum areas in the neighbouring areas students are encouraged to work for marginaslised section of the society.
- 3. Creating linkages with Local NGOs, the college is serving for the persons in need belonging primarily to the poorer sections of the society (by sharing its infrastructure and students volunteer for free eye operation camp, thalassemia detection camp, breast cancer awareness programme for the girl students etc.)
- 4. The college is organizing gender sensitizing programme.

#### 3.7 Collaboration

- 1. The college is making collaboration with an external service provider (ESSR *INFOSYS*) to provide skill development programmes to the students.
- 2. To organize UGC sponsored seminars the college is making collaboration with neighboring colleges, research institutes and professional bodies.

#### 4.1 **Physical Facilities**

1. The college has obtained its new and own address in 2008. Since then the college is continuously trying to develop its infrastructure.

- 2. However the college is still facing space constraint as there are not enough class rooms for splitting the classes with large number of students into smaller sections.
- 3. The introduction of new subjects or add-on curriculum might be severely constrained by the lack of space for expansion.
- 4. Efforts are being taken by the college to enhance its infrastructure to widen its coverage of the curriculum.

#### 4.2 **Library as Learning Resources**

- 1. Presently the college is having 13063 books in its library
- 2. During the last four years the incremental growth in the number of books has been @ 661 books per year
- 3. There is a library sub-committee to look after the development of the library but in the absence of any separate budgetary support and permanent staff the growth and development of the library is inadequate and slow

#### 4.3. IT Infrastructure

- 1. The college is having a central computer lab/centre where students are provided with their curriculum as well as basic computer literacy, facility for netsurfing for study materials.
- 2. Teachers are provided with computer facility with internet connection.
- 3. All office staff is provided with computers with internet facility.
- 4. There are four computers with net connectivity for the students and staff.

#### 4.4 **Maintenance of Resources**

- 1. The infrastructure and resources of the college are managed and maintained by the Principal with the assistance of different sub-committees, a committee comprising of the Principal along with the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college take active role in maintaining the existing resources. The committee works with such an enthusiasm that the need to outsource the function to any agency is not yet felt.
- 2. There is yet to make separate budgetary provision for maintenance of infrastructure
- 3. The college is going to install 24 hours CCTV surveillance shortly

#### *5.1* **Student Progression**

- 1. 58% of the students coming to this college are from economically challenged families having monthly per capita income of Rs 5000/- only (as per declaration of guardians in the admission application form).
- 2. The result of the attempt to reduce student dropout rates undertaken by the college so far has been encouraging. The college is successful in trying to.
- 3. The college, however, does not have a detailed record of students moving to gainful employment and higher education.
- 4. The inter-personal relationship between the teachers and the passed out students in few cases trace out the fact that most of the students for whom information are available are either doing teaching jobs in schools and colleges or various govt. services.

#### **Student Support** 5.2

- 1. The college provides primary support within the class room by delivering the lessons to the students according to plan
- 2. The college has an online platform for training and practice for competitive examination
- 3. The teachers provides support to the students in the form of "mentoring" and provides counseling in academic as well personal matters preventing them from discontinuing their studies before completion, encouraging them towards basic studies as well as moving towards further higher studies
- 4. The college further provides financial support to economically challenged students by providing fee concessions, free-ships and stipends

#### 5.3 **Student Activities**

- 1. Students actively participate in different sports activities conducted by the college.
- 2. They are also encouraged to participate in different extracurricular activities organized by the college such as cultural programmes and competitions.
- 3. They are also encouraged to take active interest to take part in different extension activities.

#### 6.1 **Institutional Vision**

- 1. From the inception of the college it has had a vision of holistic development.
- 2. The College regularly publishes its prospectus.

3. The College maintains its website regularly.

#### **6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment**

- 1. The college as an organization is governed by
  - Rules and Regulations of the UGC
  - Orders and Instructions of the Govt. of West Bengal
  - Statutory provisions of the University of Calcutta
  - Management of the Governing Body
- 2. The college maintains feedback based planning mechanism involving all the stakeholders
- 3. The college maintains a work audit calendar
- 4. The college makes use of the college website as an organ for information sharing and dissemination
- 5. The college makes use of a SMS gateway for fast communication with the students and the staff

#### 6.3 **Human Resources Management**

- 1. Teachers are encouraged to attain faculty development programme organized by Universities and other higher education and research institutes (such as refresher course, orientation programme, summer school etc)
- 2. The college is providing necessary support and training to its staff both teaching and non-teaching to match the requirements of time.

3. College is encouraging participatory management by entrusting different responsibilities to both teachers and non-teaching staff.

#### 6.4 **Financial Resources**

- 1. The college does have a modest resource base with stable corpus fund
- 2. The college therefore depends to a very large extent on funds allocated by the UGC under the schemes available in different plan periods and occasional benevolence of the MP and MLA LAD fund.
- 3. Statutory audit is up-to-date.

#### 6.5 **Internal Quality Assurance System**

- 1. The college has Internal Quality Assurance Cell. The cell is constantly making attempts to ensure qualitative improvement of the college.
- 2. In the preparation of the NAAC assessment the college appreciates the role that *IQAC* has been playing in the qualitative development of the college.
- 3. Various initiatives are taken by IQAC to ensure quality assurance.

#### 7.1 **Environment consciousness**

- 1. The college is spreading environment consciousness by its different activities e.g. Using green generator, announcing plastic free zone, no smoking zone, keep clean campus, waste bin maintenance, 'Briksa Ropan' etc.
- 2. Since the college does not have any science department with laboratories having the potential of environmental pollution, there is a need of Green Audit.

#### 7.2 **Innovations**

The college is introducing many innovations which may have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college such as:

- ✓ SMS-gateway
- ✓ Creating online platform for assessment of MCQ type tests
- ✓ *Online assessment for competitive examination*
- ✓ Online admission
- ✓ Online feedback.

#### 7.3 **Best Practices**

- 1. Among various practices the two best practices are constant efforts towards Holistic development and Work audit Calendar.
- 2. The college has commendable fellow feeling amongst students.
- 3. Harmonious relationship among the students is an asset for further improvement of the academic atmosphere of the college.
- 4. For office works more or less a deadline is maintained by the office.





  - Each teacher prepares an annual academic plan and delivers the plan towards effective implementation of the curriculum.
  - Before commencement of the new academic session a master routine is provided to the students.
  - Meetings of academic sub-committee are held to decide about the effective implementation of the curriculum.
  - Entire process is monitored by the Principal.

  - The university does not have any such support system for the undergraduate colleges.
  - The IOAC of the college is going to organize a workshop on "Innovative" Teaching Methods" shortly.

  - For effective delivery of curriculum the initiatives of the institution are

- 4) Recently faculties are provided with web application platform where they can upload MCQ type question bank on their respective subjects encouraging students for CIA.

There is very little scope of networking with the industry and / or the university for the purpose of effective operationalisation of the curriculum. But the departments of Economics and Commerce interact with their respective departments of affiliating University to get the latest guidelines for project work as and when required.

## 1.1. 6. What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?

Teachers of the college are yet to be included in the Under Graduate Board of Studies of the university and thus the institution is left with little scope to design and develop the curriculum. But when the workshops related to development of curriculum are organized by the affiliating university, faculty members actively participate and express their suggestions and views for the betterment of the existing curriculum.

## 1.1. 7. Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered other than those under the purview of the affiliating university by it? If yes give details of the process.

- As mentioned above, the institution is yet to be involved actively in the process of curriculum development. But a small syllabus is developed by the department of Computer Science for delivering basic Computer Literacy to those students who do not have any subject related to Computer as a part of their curriculum.
- Besides this, the College has introduced in collaboration with an external agency (ESSR Infosys) the following certificate courses in:
  - 1) Teachers' Training
  - 2) Multimedia and Animation
  - 3) Financial Accounting
  - 4) Communicative English

A good number of students have shown interest in getting enrolled in these courses. These courses are conducted in the college premises according to the teaching schedule and conveniences keeping the regular class routine undisturbed.

- K. K. Das College, originally known as K. K. Das College of Commerce was established in 1964. Since its inception it used to function from the premises of Dinabandhu Andrews College, Garia. Since 2008, the college has been functioning from its present address in its new building.
- The college has been diversifying at present and offering multifarious courses along with Commerce
- It has become a multi-faculty co-education college from the academic session 2001-02.
- The college now offers Honours courses in Accountancy, Economics, Mathematics, Bengali, English & History and general courses in Commerce, Economics, Mathematics, Bengali, English, History, Sociology, Education, Statistics and Computer Science.

  - **Step II**: Merit panel is prepared according to the criteria by the service provider in conformity with university rules and reservation policy of the

- GOWB and uploaded in the college website. For any problem applicants are informed by sending SMS.
- Step III: After physical verification of the documents in the College office students deposit their fees in the designated bank through a challan generated against their application no..
- **Step IV**: Presenting their paid challan receipt to the college office Cash Counter students obtain their Roll Nos.

    - 3. In recent times IQAC of the college is trying to make use of a uniquely designed web application which enables the college to engage in profile mapping of the students in terms of their knowledge and skills.

    - b) to the Head of the Departments to make allocation of the courses amongst the teachers

  - The college does not have any Virtual laboratories, e-learning (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education facility. However, the college is a registered member of the NLIST programme through which the teachers can make use of several journals and e-books.

- College organizes expert lecture to boost them morally, to create confidence among them.

- The library caters to the needs of the teachers and students by providing access to books and journals.
- The library contains a moderate number of text books of various courses and some Reference Books.
- The books from central library are issued to the students and faculty members while the book banks facilitate reading in free periods.
- The library facility was extended on account of the verbal student feedback and it functions from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm.
- The books in general library are categorized subject wise..
- There is Book Bank facility to cater exclusively to the needs of the underprivileged students and are issued for one year as per their need. Books for Competitive Examinations are issued to the students.

- The departments provide requisitions for books, magazines and journals' to the Librarian in each and every session, which is then approved by the Finance Committee subject the availability of funds. The purchase is made through the purchase committee.
- 2.3.10. Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.
  - The institution has built-in mechanisms to ensure curriculum completion within the planned time frame.
  - Constant monitoring by the concerned authority and Academic Sub Committee to ensure effective implementation of the work plans.
  - However, at times the institution faces a few challenges in completing the curriculum within planned time frame and calendar in extra-ordinary circumstances.
  - The most common challenge faced is unexpected closure to reason beyond the control of the institution. Faculty members take extra classes for the completion of the courses. The demand for intensive teaching for conceptual clarity for certain batches of students, especially first year undergraduate students is me with; extra classes are taken for the completion of the course content.

  - However temporary and guest faculty are appointed by the college on need basis maintaining required qualifications.

  - The Institution has evolved a mechanism of finding out a self appraisal score of the teacher based on structured questionnaire.

  - The college has a well designed Academic Calendar in place.
  - The calendar amongst other things contains information about monthly test schedules, test examinations as well as university examinations thereby enabling the student and faculty to remain fully aware about the evaluation process

  - Institution introduced regular class test and Online MCO test as formative evaluation along with university stipulated summative test.

  - The evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the college are implemented by the Examination Sub Committee and Academic Sub Committee.

  - The college takes regular class tests/unit tests which form the basis of formative evaluation.
  - Class attendance of the students has improved for this
  - The college also takes a mid-term test and the test examination which forms the basis of summative evaluation
- 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc).
  - Affiliated colleges do not have the opportunity to assign weightages to the internal assessments except a few subjects.

  - According to the affiliating University to obtain graduate degree in Honours in a subject a student has to secure 40% marks and to obtain graduate degree in general course a student has to secure 30% marks. The whole process of teaching and learning is emphasising this aspect.

- Students can record their grievance with regard to the evaluation of answer scripts and the university remains liable to review the answer scripts in all such cases.

- The college has developed an online feedback web application mechanism where students can record their grievance about the evaluation process of the college.

#### Student performance and Learning Outcomes *2.6.*

  - The college wishes to see its students as not only academically accomplished but socially conscious individuals and meaningfully employed in productive work after completion of studies. Dynamic interaction among the students, staff and parents are made to make them aware of this mission of the college to impart holistic education.

  - During the parent teachers meeting, parents are informed about students' performance.
  - Students of Honours courses, failing to come up to required standard after repeated warnings and specialized attention and assistance are advised to shift to General courses from Honours courses so that they don't have to face failure in the university examination.
  - The college keeps a close watch on academic progress of each student and promptly takes appropriate corrective measures as and when necessary.

  - The Principal meets and interacts with the faculties to sensitise them on the intended learning outcomes.
  - The faculties on the other hand decide on their respective strategies of teachinglearning evaluation so that the students attain the intended learning outcomes.

  - However, the college strives to develop an industry college network through different agencies, career fairs are organized to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered.

  - The performance of the students in the formative examinations are seriously analysed by the faculties to adopt appropriate measures for further improvement of the students.

• Students lagging in knowledge and skills are taken special care of so that they feel encouraged to work hard and overcome the barriers of learning. Remedial/tutorial classes are held to assist them.

- After each term, the respective teacher prepares a complete report of all the activities of students, i.e. marks in the university examination, class tests, progress made by the students in the class, absentees etc.
- Parents of irregular students are informed from time to time through the SMS **Gateway**






#### 4.1 Physical Facilities

# 4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

From its inception, the college was running as an evening college sharing the building with Dinabandhu Andrews College. Over the years the college started feeling the need for a separate building so that the intake capacity could be increased. For this reason, they also felt the necessity to introduce new courses and shift the college hours from evening to day. After a long and arduous struggle by the Governing Body, the then president and principal, faculty members, staff members, students, people of the locality and also with the help of the Government, the college achieved its new and own address, and shifted in 2008.

From then on, the main objective of the college has been to develop its infrastructure to support its students. But due to various obstacles and shortage of funds, it is taking time to complete the construction of the building. Till now, the college has been able to complete its second floor. The college is trying to avail funds from MPLAD, MLALAD etc. to complete the construction of the third floor of the building.

#### 4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

- a) Curricular and co-curricular activities - classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces.
  - Classrooms: There are 15 classrooms apart from the library and computer laboratory. The big classrooms are well ventilated, with lots of sunlight, ideal for a crowded classroom. Three classrooms have audio facilities.
  - Technology enabled learning spaces: 2
  - Computer Laboratory: There is a well-designed modern computer laboratory. LCD projector, laptop and 26 computers with internet connections are available. There is a Staff to maintain the systems and to provide technical assistance to the faculty members and students. The computers/laptops are also interfaced with LCDs to develop Power Point Presentations for teaching purposes.
  - Specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc. are available. Some classrooms are well-equipped with audio facilities and some are equipped with visual teaching aids. These facilities are also available for the teachers who are engaged in research activities.
  - **Conference Room:** The college does not have any separate conference room but a big classroom (Room 205) is converted into a conference room (when necessary) with advanced audio-visual multi-media facilities like LCD projector, laptop and computer with high configuration of the latest generation with internet connection to organize seminars, lectures and other academic activities and administrative meetings.

b) Extra -curricular activities - sports, outdoor and indoor games, NSS, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.

#### Sports, outdoor and indoor games:

- Students take part in inter-college, district level competitions in different events. The college does not have its own playground but has a written permission from a club to use their ground as playground for our students.
- The Boys' common space is equipped with indoor games like Table Tennis and Carom.
- Girls' common room is equipped with indoor games like carom.
- NSS unit has individual space in one room to reserve their documents and equipments and they carry out their extension activities from this space.
- **Eco-Club** of the college functions to enhance environmental consciousness among the students of the college. Due to space constraints, no separate space has yet been allotted to the Eco Club and the activities of the Club are organized by the members with support from the faculty members and students of the college.
- **Literary Society** of the college nurtures the creative side of the students. It attempts to provide the right exposure to students in the form of workshops with external experts, debate, creative writing competitions. It aims to enhance the speaking and writing skill of students.
- Cultural Society of the college is in charge of organizing various cultural activities like recitation competition, Teachers' Day Celebration etc.
- **Health and Hygiene:** The College does not have a health unit as such but first aid equipments and a stretcher are available for use in emergency

situations. An on-call doctor is available and the college is also situated in close proximity to a government hospital.

  - Grievance Redressal Cell, Women's Cell is functional in the college but there is no separate space for them. The Principal, faculties operate these cells either from the staff room or from Principal's Room due to huge shortage of classrooms.

- Career Counselling Cell has a separate room constructed from the UGC fund (XI Plan) but this room is also used as classroom during the busy hours for the same reason mentioned above.
- Canteen: There is a subsidized canteen in the ground floor. Quality food, tea and snacks are served from there at a subsidized rate.
- Recreational Spaces for staff and students: There is a girls' common room equipped with a colour television, and carom board with attached toilet.
- At the ground floor there is a space for boys where they are provided with table tennis board, carom board etc.
- There is a spacious staff room for teachers equipped with refrigerator, microwave oven, computers with internet connection.
- Safe drinking water facility: Safe drinking water facility is provided for all staff and students. Aqua guard with RO purifiers are installed in different floors.
- Auditorium/ Conference Room: The college does not have any separate conference room but a big classroom (Room 205) is converted into a conference room (when necessary) with advanced audio-visual multi-media facilities like LCD projector, laptop and computer with high configuration of the latest generation with internet connection to organize seminars, lectures and other academic activities, administrative meetings along with various cultural and cocurricular activities.

  - o There is a library sub-committee. This committee comprises of the librarian (till 2014), HODs and the Principal.   - o Digitization of the library is in progress. The college is a member of Inflibnet and has subscribed to N-List for the access of e-resources. Initiative is being taken to orient the students about library usage by displaying various details about books and resources available in the library.

- a) K. K. Das College, originally known as K. K. Das College of Commerce was established in 1964. Since its inception it had been functioning from the premises of Dinabandhu Andrews College, Garia but has now shifted to its own building in 2008.
- b) The college started planning for its development since the early 1990's.
- c) It kept both short run and long run perspective plan in mind.
- d) While functioning from a shared building as a commerce college in the evening shift - and that too only for boys -the college has recently diversified in terms of curriculum and from a college of Commerce it has become a multi-faculty co-education college from the academic session 2001-02. The college now offers Honours courses in Accounting, Economics, Mathematics, Bengali, English and History and therefore has shifted to an address of its own.
- e) The college appreciates the importance of accreditation and subsequent receipt of funding from RUSA or otherwise to gear the college up for further development.
- f) IQAC appreciates that perspective plan document should include quality assurance plan as an important component of the institution's strategy development and deployment process and thus urges upon the Governing Body to consider the given leadership of appreciating qualitative development of the college during the post accreditation phase.
